Over my time as a pastor and a person, I am reminded of the importance of silence.

Silence is a spiritual discipline, that is, a consistent practice which helps us follow Jesus. Silence is like having the correct hiking shoes for a hike. Silence helps us pray to God about, and for, God's direction for our lives, to be mindful of the needs of others and the world, and to hear our heartbeats (which, have you noticed, can really only be heard in silence?). From his book, The Power of Silence: Against the Dictatorship of Noise, Robert Cardinal Sarah writes: "Silence is difficult, but it enables (one) to let (oneself) to be led by God" (p. 54).

I must confess I have work to do when it comes to a discipline of silence. As someone who likes a podcast, radio, TV, etc. "on," practicing silence is not automatic. It can feel unproductive. The more I practice silence, the more I like it. What's more, with consistent times of silence in my days and weeks, the more serene my life happens to be.

Indeed, silence provides time to pray for people, the world, and their circumstances. Life tends to be more centered with consistent times of silence.

Some people use their time of silence to write about life or write their prayers. Some people new to a discipline of silence also set a timer and work their way into longer periods of silence. However, and whenever silence works for each of us, silence can increase our connection with God – so often beneficial.


Jesus took time away for solitude and silence in the midst of his life and ministry. So too can his followers, his disciples – including all of us.

### Additional Thoughts from the Assembly:

The Sargent County churches needed a rostered pastor, but none were available, and it became evident none would become available. Some members of these churches worked together to become synod-authorized ministers, SAMs. On June 15th, 12 lay people in Sargent County churches were authorized as SAMs.

As I see many rural churches without a rostered pastor, this ministry is becoming very viable in the Eastern ND Synod and other synods with shrinking populations in rural areas. In a way, this is like the past when there were circuit rider pastors.

When I think of lay people helping, I think of material needs, such as food, transportation or shelter. It was heart warming to see neighbors working together to share the good news of God working in their communities and a God of possibilities.



Some things from our voting members at the synod assembly in early June:

-During offering, passing the plate and it being a time where people would leave a note about wanting to help with or volunteer for something in church.

-Wonderful and inspiring presentations from Rev Tim Brown, ELCA Director of Congregational Stewardship and Eastern ND Synod Bishop, Rev Tess Moon Leiseth.

-Informative and helpful breakout (small group) sessions led by pastors and lay leaders in the synod on ways they are serving and growing their ministries in a changing culture and the church's response.

-Good connections with colleagues and friends from across the synod and people we've met at previous assemblies.



"Generosity is a taught habit" says Rev Tim Brown, the keynote speaker at this year's EaND Synod Assembly. We are called by God to be good stewards of earth and neighbor. One of the ways we do this is certainly through financial giving to various institutions. However, our generosity and stewardship goes into every interaction we have with one another and with this world God has made. Stewardship is an ongoing conversation between God and us.

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As part of Synod Assembly this year, I led a workshop in which we discussed the church's impact on people who live with disabilities. I led this alongside Chris Larson and Hannah Papenfuss. My hope is that this workshop becomes a launching point for further ongoing conversation among congregations and organiza-

The Church Council met on June 11, 2025. Pastor Nicholas led the Council in a discussion of Stewardship, based on materials presented at the Synod Assembly June 6-8. goals and activity over the past month.

The **Property Committee** reported on the current cleaning contract with ServiceMaster. Work has been done to assess the usability of the old dishwasher in the kitchen; it is about 45-50 years old, and it has now been cleaned and repaired. They received a quote for a replacement of \$25,000. No action at this point was recommended or taken.

The **Technology Committee** reports that the new streaming computer is up and works great and came in under budget.

The **Children and Youth Committee** indicated that about 60 children attended VBS June 3-5. Serving for "Free Lunch Fridays" is ongoing, with about 25 individuals attending each of the first couple of Fridays.

The Council discussed **funding for the radio broadcast**. Janet and Margaret reported on their review of the account, noting that we ended 2024 with a deficit of \$1600. At mid year, we have a \$900 deficit, with a total of 20 services not yet sponsored/paid for the year.

The Kathryn-Nome-Fingal Contract for July-Dec 2025 was reviewed and approved; the new agreement includes payment for mileage.

The Council approved updated language in the Building Use Policy to clarify the difference between using the church for a meeting vs. a reception.

Pastor Nicholas indicated that a youth group from Sommerset, WI, has requested overnight accommodations on July 18<sup>th</sup> as they travel home from Montana; Council approved use of the empty parsonage for this purpose.

### Did You Know???

The first mention of a Radio Broadcast at OSLC is in the 1933 Pastor's annual report, where he indicates that the church is supporting both a radio broadcast of OSLC services and also the broadcast of the services in Norwegian from a church in Kathryn.
