Hello from church! Admittedly, I have too many books. Such can be the life of a pastor. One that has been with me a long time is Confessions, by Augustine of Hippo. It is an autobiography of sorts written by one of Christianity's influential thinkers. Augustine lived in northern Africa from 354-430, a few hundred years after Jesus.

Augustine's Confessions is a combination of his personal experience, trying to apply God and the Bible to his life, and how to make (some) sense of himself (his story and life), God, and the world. It's considered one of the first autobiographies of Western thought; theologians and philosophers over the centuries have spilled gallons of ink (whether pen- or copier-based), about the book and what it means for Christians who both love God and know that sometimes we aren't, and want to be, our best selves. I recommend it. Experience it slowly.

My copy has a wonderful introduction. Part of it caught my eye: "Throughout this ancient story, our author (Augustine) comes to realize that it is not until he can tell his story from God's perspective that he actually has a story to tell." Hmmm.... "Tell his (own) story from God's perspective."

That got me to ponder... How would God tell my story? How would God tell your story? How would God tell our story as a congregation? Where would God start? Would God include everything, skip over the boring bits, polish to a shine the wonderful days, and clean the icky times?

It seems how we answer that question will inform us about what we believe about God and who God is for us and for the world. Soon we will have warmer temperatures, campfires, and story-times; how about trying out your God-written story?

The sacred writings we call the Bible began as spoken stories shared between people, then shared from one generation to the next. The life of God's people is very much at home in the form of stories. As we think about our lives, let us consider them from God's perspective – as that is, ultimately, the one perspective that really truly, matters most.

Give it a start..."God, I don't know how you'd tell my story, but here's what I'd love you to include..." Doing that can get us connected to God in a very real way. What would you type or write?





CROP Walk for World Hunger May 7

The 45th annual Valley City CROP Walk for Hunger is set for Wednesday, May 7 at 7 p.m. on the Jefferson school mile. Walkers may start collecting pledges and making donations now. See crophungerwalk.org or stop by the church office for pledge and donor forms.

Seventy five percent of the money raised goes to fight hunger around the world and the remaining 25 percent remains in the local community in a distribution to the Barnes County Food Pantry, the Hi-Liner Food Pantry at Valley City Public Junior/Senior High, and the Valley City State University Food Pantry. In 2024, more than \$5244.06 was raised for this hunger relief.

The CROP Walk is a nationwide movement sponsored by Church World Service to raise funds to end hunger and poverty in the United States and around the world. Now there are

more than 500 communities across the United States that participate. Valley City's participation in this event started in 1981 with the help of the late Rev. Wayne McKirdy (who was a United Methodist pastor), Kay Kringlie, Myrt Pommeroy, and Wes Retterath (from St. Catherine's Catholic Church).

The Church Council met on April 9, 2025. Treasurer Janet Brown report on our status at the end of the first quarter, noting that giving is up a little compared to last year. Thank you to all who are stepping up to help us keep our budget on track!

Each of the committees reported on their 2025 goals and activity over the past month.

The **Property Committee** noted the completion of the Kitchen; the Youth room is next on the list!

The **Technology Committee** is discussing options for upgrading the streaming computer.

The **Service and Sharing Committee** is hard at work on this year's goal – to raise \$3000 during Lent to offset some of the public school's hot lunch program debt.

The **Congregational Life Committee** is working on Graduation Recognition activities, to include a newsletter insert and church service blessing for each graduate.

The Children and Youth Committee has updated the children's activity bags for use during church; they are starting to plan Vacation Bible School; 6 children took their first communion in April.

The **Worship and Music Committee** is preparing for Easter, planning the Easter garden. They will be sending out a survey regarding congregation preferences for updating the worship experience at Our Savior's.

The **Call Committee** met with Pr. Skogen from the Eastern ND Synod immediately prior to the council meeting for training. The MSP will be "live" starting April 10. If you know of someone who might be interested in ministry at OSLC, please urge them to review our MSP online and contact Pr. Skogen at the synod office to express their interest.

Council approved the purchase of a new computer or computer elements up to \$1000; the Technology Committee will research and purchase what is needed to assure continued worship service streaming.

The Council discussed the future viability of the Radio Broadcast; at this point, we have heard from three members regarding the radio broadcast. Council members were asked to continue to take input from the congregation to share at the May meeting, to listen to the broadcast so they can report personally on their listening experience. If you have any further comments or concerns, please be sure to talk with one of the Council members before the May 14 meeting.

The Council approved the appointment of Leslie Rohde as our 4th representative for Synod Assembly in June 2025; Council also approved a change in worship time for the Summer: Fellowship hour at 8:45, followed by Worship at 9:30, beginning Memorial Day weekend.
